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1. Foreword

This report is to serve as a guide to Police activity and the type of demand within the relevant council areas. Its content is there to help support discussion at the meeting with your policing representative. As directed within the body of the email, all questions and enquires should be directed to the representative attached to your local council. They will be copied into the report when it is sent.

We are fortunate to live in a rural part of the world, with small communities that know one another. As such, the detail, in the report is deliberately lacking in specific content, except where a press release has been undertaken. This is to maintain the anonymity of victims of crime. Should councils wish for more precise work to be done on specific locations, i.e. identified trouble spots and the demand they create, you would need to link with your representative to facilitate this work.

Depending on the council area, you may see more or less crime than would usually be detailed in any previous reports. This is because we work under 'Beat Areas' when reviewing crime. Some council areas might cross these beat boundaries, i.e. Tayvallich is in Beat 42, which also encapsulates Lochgilphead, so their council report will show more crime than it would have previously seen. This does not translate to a sudden crime spike, but rather shows a more informative view of this part of Mid Argyll. Where two councils fall under the same beat, one report will be produced to cover both.

2. Crimes, Incidents & Demand

During July there were **318** calls for service for the Mid Argyll, Kintyre and Islands policing area. **12** of these calls related to the Carradale beat area (Beat 38). This demand consisted of:

1x Road Traffic Matters, 1x Road Traffic Collisions, 2x Concern for Person, 3 x Abandoned/Silent 999 Call, 1x Animal Related, 1x Assault, 1x Public Nuisance, 1x Communications, 1x Assist Other Agency.

In August there were **361** calls for service for the Mid Argyll, Kintyre and Islands policing area. 9 of these calls related to the Carradale beat area. This demand consisted of

5x Road Traffic Matters, 1x Assist Member of Public, 1x False Call, 1x Abandoned Vehicle.

The above demand translated into the following crime being recorded:

* It is to be noted that not every call to Police will result in a crime being raised. Equally, crimes can be raised without a call being received.

Assault: between 9am on 13th and 6.35am on 20th July at Broomfield, Carradale, a man (43) allegedly assaulted a woman. Police arrested and charged the man and a report will be sent to the Procurator Fiscal

Wilful Fire Raising: A Police Scotland spokesperson said: "A 15-year-old boy has been charged following a report of wilful fire raising at an industrial site in Carradale. "The fire was reported to police around 10pm on Friday, 22 July, 2022, at an industrial site on Shore Road in Carradale, Campbeltown. "No-one was injured and the boy will be reported to the Children's Reporter"
